
On July 25, thirteen temple members and I visited Japan. Six high school students, two college students, one middle school student, chaperones and I began our ten-day trip to Japan. The main purpose of this trip was to introduce and expose our Jr. YBA members to the Japan where Jodo Shinshu had its beginning. We vis-

Every morning, we attended morning services, chanted Shoshinge with other attendees at the Hongwanji in Kyoto and Tsukiji Hongwanji in Tokyo. We visited twenty-two temples and shrines in Kyoto, Nara, Tokyo, and Hiroshima. We saw a variety

ited temples every day



of statues of Buddha, Bodhisattvas and deities. Some were as tall as fifty feet high or as small as five inches, some standing and some sitting, some outside and some inside of the temple. Some were National Treasures and some were sold at shops. We visited temples to see the statues but we also had *zazen* sessions

and sang with temple nursery school students at the temples. We passed by a lot of temples. It is said that the number of the temples in Kyoto is greater than the number of convenience stores, so consciously and unconsciously, the Jr. YBA kids were soaked in the Buddhist atmosphere of Japan.

Not only did we visit temples, we went to a Japanese professional baseball game, saw hanabi (fireworks), sang karaoke, and ate many tasty food. They enjoyed the safe environment of Japan. On the second night of the trip, we had dinner at a restaurant in the Kyoto station after which I told the Jrs.to go back to their hotel at Hongwanji by themselves. It was around 9 p.m. so they looked a little uneasy, but, unlike L.A., Japan is very safe and once they understood the safeness of the night in Japan, they voluntarily went back to the hotel without chaperones. They enjoyed convenience store hopping, from Lawson to Seven Eleven, buying sodas and ice creams.

The Jrs. learned a lot from this trip. One thing they learned is how fast I walk. We walked a lot, about 20,000 steps, 8 to 10 miles per day, visiting temples and other sites. Some days when our schedule was tight, we had to walk fast and sometimes run from one platform to another to catch a train. Trains in Japan come on time and leave on time. The Jrs. are young enough to catch up with me, but sometimes I had to look back to make sure everyone was following me. Then I remembered a famous statue of Amida Buddha in Kyoto. The statue is called Mikaeri Amida, which means "looking back Amida Buddha." This statue is enshrined in Eikan-do which is a Jodo Shu temple in the eastern part of Kyoto. The face of the statue cannot be seen from the front because the face is looking back. According to temple history, when a monk, Eikan, did a walking *Nembutsu* meditation, Amida Buddha's statue stepped down from the



altar and led Eikan to walk. Then Amida Buddha looked back and said "Hurry, are you following me?" In order to remember this, the statue was carved and enshrined in the temple. When I looked back as we walked the streets of Kyoto, I did not think "Hurry," I just counted to make sure everyone was coming with me. I took the Jrs. to the Eikan-do to see this statue so they may associate the statue with me.

On another day, we visited Nara where we saw another rare statue of Amida Buddha. It is enshrined in Shunjo-do temple in Todai-ji temple. This Amida Buddha is a standing statue with a nail through the left foot. It is said that Shinran Shonin stayed

in this temple, where he studied at Todai-ji for certain period when he was very young. According to a minister of this Shunjo-do, "Shinran Shonin was so handsome like me, so when Shinran Shonin finished his study and on the day he returned to Hieizan, Amida Buddha's statue did not want Shinran Shonin to leave." If Shinran Shonin

left the temple, Amida Buddha:s statue would also leave the temple to follow Shinran Shonin. Therefore, a monk drove a nail on the left foot of the statue. This statue is called *Kugiuchi no Amida* which means driven nail Amida Buddha. When I saw the statue and heard the story, I thought the Jrs. may also want to drive a nail on my foot so that I could not walk so fast.

On this trip, we saw many statues of Amida Buddha. The Jrs. may wonder "why are there so many different statues of the same Buddha?" and why are there

so many fancy stories related to the statues. And for now, that is OK. In the future, as they continue listening to the teaching, they will appreciate the stories and their hidden meanings. Amida Buddha is trying to reach us by using various ways and various forms, consciously and unconsciously. This trip was very meaningful to reach a deeper understanding of Jodo Shinshu. I appreciate the financial support from the temple to the Jr YBA members for this trip. I believe the Jrs. will support the temple in the future and give support to the future Jr. YBA members.



College Savings 529 Plan

MESP (Michigan Education Savings Program) and mail it directly to PO Box 55925, Boston, MA 02205-5925. Be sure to send a note indicating the contribution is to go to the Senshin Buddhist Temple, Account #9393725.

If you write a check to Senshin, there is no minimum. If you write a check to MESP, the check must be \$25 or more.

Senshin Vehicle Donation

This is a reminder that Senshin will take any vehicle (car, pickup, truck, motorcycle, and even boat) as a donation to the temple. The funds realized from these donations are earmarked for the Senshin-ji Building Fund. Donors can report the full amount of funds received from the vehicle donation as a deduction on their tax returns.

We work with Harold's Car Donation Service (HCDS) to have the vehicles picked up, processed and refurbished as necessary to bring in the highest sale amount for the donated vehicle. Even if the vehicle is not operational, it can still have salvageable value, sometimes for



more than we could expect.

Once the proceeds from the vehicle donation are received by Senshin, a letter is sent to the donor to acknowledge the vehicle donation. The letter includes details of the donated vehicle and the amount for which the vehicle was sold or salvaged. All donors will be acknowledged in the Prajna.

Senshin-ji Building Fund September 2016 Update

The construction fence around the Social Hall was erected on Friday, August 5 and the demolition crews arrived on Monday, August 8. We finally were able to get the remodeling work under way!

We are hoping to have the remodeling/construction work completed by the end of January 2017. We realize that during the course of construction, there are likely to be some "surprises" as with any type of construction project of this scope and size. We will hope for the best and plan for the worst.

As for the termite issue noted in the previous month's article, it was found that the termite infestation in the basement was due to subterranean termites. With that information in hand, the treatment of the soil around the perimeter of the Social Hall will be undertaken in coordination with the demolition of the concrete surfaces surrounding the building. Once the new concrete forms and reinforcement bars are set in place, the Satoh Brothers crews will call in the pest exterminator crews who will inject the soil with the appropriate chemicals to terminate the termites.

In conjunction with the inspection of the Social Hall, we also asked for

an inspection of the garage that is on the temple rental house property adjacent to the Social Hall. The garage was infested with dry wood termites and it was decided to tent and fumigate that structure and the storage shed that is attached to it. That process was concluded on August 5 as well, so the garage is now pest free for at least two to three years (hopefully).

The garage will become a general storage structure for the temple and will be able to hold larger items that need to be housed. Much of what is in there currently are equipment and materials that had to be removed from the Social Hall storage rooms and kitchen for the duration of the remodeling work. Other items that were in need of temporary storage are in two of the Education Building classrooms, while the other items are in the two "crying" rooms of the Hondo. Once the Social Hall work is completed, equipment and materials will be transferred back to that building which will have been configured to handle all of its storage needs.

We are now forming a Karate Club. The purpose of this club is to enhance the physical and mental health of the temple members and their friends as well as learning Buddhist thoughts through the training.



"虎と龍"曾我蕭白

この掛け軸は大き過ぎてお寺の床の間には収まらず、軸の 下部は巻かれたままで全部が見られません。

この躍動感溢れる絵は、江戸時代(1730-1781)の著名な画家蘇我蕭白の作品です。

マス先生が1960年代日本に滞在されていた時、約2万円(現在のレートで\$200)で入手されたのですが、

当時としては大学卒業者の平均月給に相当し、かなり高価に思われました。

"その頃は日本では西洋のアートが好まれ、古い日本の芸術品は割安だった"とマス先生は言われます。

この絵の主題の虎と龍は、中国では勇敢、勇気を象徴し、 その故日本でも侍達に好まれていました。

中国の伝統では龍は東、虎は西を示しますので、龍は右側、虎は左側に配置されます。

マス先生がこの絵をLACMAの専門家に見せたところ、多分蕭白の弟子が大部分を描いたのだろう、龍の鼻毛が蕭白の作品としては軽すぎる、蕭白だったらもっと大胆にダイナミックに描いたに違いないと言われたそうです。確かに鼻毛は白く軽い感じがしますが、力強い印象深い作品です。
