




Toban, Won The Turn

Thirty-one years ago, Mas-sensei and Russell Hamada-sensei started a summer school program for 1st to 3rd graders together with Bessie Tanaka, June Kondo and Terry Nakawatase, as their teachers. There were about thirty students that year and the program was named *Saishin Dojo*. This summer, there were about ninety students, 1st through 6th graders, coming to *Saishin Dojo*.

The *kanji*, “*sai*,” means “west” and the *kanji*, “*shin*” means *kokoro*



(heart and mind), so *Saishin* could be read as a symbolic name for Pure Land Buddhists. The sutra states the direction of the Pure Land is west and directs our heart and mind to the Pure Land. However, the origin of the name, *Saishin*, is simple. It is an abbreviation of the two temples “Nishi Hongwanji Betsuin” and “Senshin,” that joined forces to start the

summer school program. The *kanji*, *nishi*, which means west can also be read as “*sai*,” and “*shin*” which means kokoro, came from Senshin’s *shin*. *Dojo* is the place to learn the way of life. For four weeks, the children learn the Buddhist way of life through the Dharma messages, Japanese cultural classes and other activities with their classmates.

There are some special tasks at Saishin Dojo that the students are not usually required to do at their regular school. One of them is cleaning up the social hall. They use the social hall for their classes, exercise, playing and eating their lunches. They also clean the floor and wipe the tables after lunchtime. This is how they learn the way of Buddhist life. Cleaning up is an important practice for the Buddhist. Buddhists see “Inside is outside.” It means our thought influences our environment and our environment influences our hearts and minds. Hence, if we clean outside, we can have clean heart and mind. If we wipe the table, the spot on the heart and mind is gone. If we sweep the floor, the dust of our heart and mind is taken away. But the table gets dirty and the floor gets dusty again, so we need to clean every day.

At Saishin Dojo, the 1st graders to the 6th graders take turns to clean the social hall. We call it *Toban* in Japanese. *Toban* means “the person in charge, on duty or on responsibility.” Here, in the U.S., the students do not clean up their classrooms. A janitor or volunteer parent cleans the floor and tables. In a sense, the students

are deprived of their chance to clean their hearts and minds. But if they come to Saishin Dojo, they clean the social hall. It is for themselves and also for others. Everyone feels refreshed when they see the clean floor and tables. It is a very pleasant and gratifying feeling.

“*Toban*” in *kanji* has a meaning, “won the turn.” *Toban*’s “*To*” means won, like having won the lottery, jackpot or a raffle prize. It is hard to win, so when we win, we feel happy and scream, “Yes,” while others may praise or, sometime, envy us. I told the kids, “It’s the same thing. When it

listen to the Nembutsu teaching, and hard to receive *Shinjin*, (awakening/faith). It is as hard as it is to win the lottery. Now I am going to read the name of the person who won the *Shinjin*, so listen carefully.” Then he started to read Rennyo Shonin’s letter (*Gobunsho*), the chapter on the Ignorant Beings of the Final Age: “In this final age of extreme uncertainty, all unenlightened men and women who single-mindedly and devotedly rely on Amida’s Eighteenth Vow, no matter how heavy the weight of their evil karma may be, will be assured of deliverance through Amida



is your *Toban*, you are very fortunate. You won the turn to clean up.” Of course, the kids may not agree with this thought, but, at least, they know that cleaning is important. It is not a punishment. It is something that gives good influence to their lives.

Regarding winning, there is a famous Jodo Shinshu story. This story is about a devoted follower, Saichi Asahara who lived in the Shimane prefecture in the late 19th century. At the end of the Dharma message, the minister said, “It was very hard to

Buddha.....” Hearing it, Saichi suddenly stood up and screamed, “I won! I won! I am the ignorant, who is saved by Amida!” Our heart and mind is hard to be cleaned up but we can fortunately listen to the Nembutsu teaching that is hard to encounter. We should remember that we won the chance to come to the temple to listen to the teaching.

掃除当番

西心道場には今年、1年生から6年生まで約90名の生徒が集まり、4週間お寺でいろいろなことを学びました。この夏の子供向けプログラムは、31年前に始まったもので、最初は1年生から3年生の約30名が参加しました。マス先生、ラッセル浜田先生が仏教を教え、ベッシー田中

西心道場の名前は、浄土教徒にふさわしいように思えます。西の方向にあるといわれるお浄土に心を向ける、というイメージが湧いてきます。けれども、もともとは、ただ単にロサンゼルス西本願寺別院と洗心から、西と心の一文

字ずつをとっただけだそうです。道場とは、道を学ぶ場という意味があり、西心道場では仏道を学ぶということになるでしょう。ですから、道場では学校の勉強や、豆腐作りや竹馬、歌などの日本文

さをお話しています。

「自分の外側を掃除することは、自分の内側である心を綺麗にすること」とか、「掃除をしてきれいになると、自分と他人もすがすがしい気持ちになり、社会のためになる」などと教えます。

掃除は学年ごとに当番で行うので、当番の意味も教えます。当番は、自分の順番ということですが、漢字を見てみると、「順番が当たる」と読めます。つまりは、宝くじや、ラッフルチケットやジャックポットが当たったと同様、掃除の順番が当たった、と喜ぶべきことなのだ、と子供達に言って

い難い仏法に遭い、得がたい信心をいただくことが出来たのは、宝くじに当たったようなものだ」と、お話されたそうです。そして、「今からその宝くじに当たった者の名前を読み上げる」と言い、御文章の「末代無智の章」を読み始めました。「末代無智の在家止住の男女たらんともがらは、心をつにして阿弥陀仏を深くたのみまいらせて、、、」と聞いたオーさんは、思わずたちあがり、両手をあげて、「当たった。当たった。」と喜び叫ばれたそうです。

私たちの心はなかなか綺麗になりませんし、毎日悪業を積み、日々汚くなっているように思われます。けれどもそのことを常に反省し、できるだけ綺麗にしよう、と思うことが大切です。そしてそういう者をこそ救うという阿弥陀さまの



化を学ぶだけではなく、仏教の教えを身につけるという目的があります。そのため、毎朝、本堂でお勤めをして法話を聞きます。他にも、子供達にはソーシャルホールの掃除当番があります。

仏教では掃除は大切な修行もしくは報謝行とされています。休憩時間後と、昼食後の二回、フロアを掃き、テーブルを拭きます。日本と違って、アメリカの学校では自分の教室や校内を掃除する習慣がないので、最初は皆嫌がります。ですから、法話で掃除の大切

いします。掃除をして心がすがすがしくなることは、たいへんラッキーなことなのです。もちろん、子供達は、納得しませんが、少なくとも、掃除は大切なことなのだ、というような感想は持つようです。

Hondo Repairs Almost Completed...for 2017

The repair and replacements to the Hondo ceiling, roof and HVAC system have been completed. We had reported the details of the project in the July Prajna, and are pleased to report that the last of the painting and repairs to the ceiling and roof have been completed. We have a new heating and air-conditioning system (HVAC), new ducting, circuit breakers, wiring, and thermostats. The roof has been replaced, and asbestos has been removed from the ceiling of the Hondo. The ceiling has been restored with the retro popcorn ceiling so as to maintain the wonderful acoustics of the Hondo, and we replaced the recessed lights with LED bulbs for energy and cost conservation, and the fact that they should last over 40+ years until we have to replace them. There is a new sparkle to our 50-year-old Naijin; more on that later.

The one remaining thing to do for the Hondo is the carpet. We intend to replace the carpet during the August recess. The colors and materials will retain the look and feel of the tradition of the Hondo, while allowing us to

repair and maintain the carpet over time. We thank you for your patience. A special thank you goes out to David Noda for his expert consultation.


