A few weeks later, while talking to Patti Honkawa-san at the temple, she told me that her brothers grow flowers in Carpinteria,

near Santa Barbara, and had a store in the flower market.

"Which store?" I asked, and Pattisan said, "Kono and Sons." Shortly after this conversation, on a Friday when I went to buy the *kiku*, a Japanese the store and we take the flowers. middle-aged man asked me, "Are you the minister of the temple that my sister business and economy. attends?" He was Patti-san's brother and he said, "Take some kiku. No need to pay." Since then, whenever I go to the store, they don't receive money and I receive the best *kiku* in town.

Thanks to their generous donation, we can adorn our altar very nicely. As a token of gratitude, we give a yearend gift. I don't know the price of kiku so I am not sure if the gift matches the price of the *kiku* we receive. But from the Buddhists' *Dana*, which is the origin of the word, donation, it is good.

The ideal Buddhist Dana is "give

and give." It is not the "give and take" format that we practice in our daily lives. For example, when we buy a bunch of flowers at a grocery store, we might pay \$12. We give \$12 to This exchange is what takes place in

On the contrary, "give and give" is to not expect the taking or returning. The flower store gives the flowers to us but does not take the \$12. However. we want to show our gratitude so we give thanks with a gift. This is not paying for the cost of the flowers. This exchange takes place in Buddhism and during some religious holidays.

"Give and give" is often demonstrated with gift-giving, such as the gift of gratitude or a gift to express support. A scholar who studies gift from ancient times to modern times

stated that gift exchanging can connect people and enhance mutual respect. This is helpful to create a peaceful society.

Dana for the temple is sometimes called Kisha. Kisha means enjoy throwing. Ki means joy and happiness. Sha means throw away. It is difficult to throw away money with a smile. Jodo Shinshu temples have been sustained by Kisha. As we approach the end of the year, we have opportunities to practice Kisha to the temple and during the holidays. Let us try it to see if we can enjoy throwing or not. The experience can be very meaningful for us.

ダーナ、ギブアンドテイクとギブアンドギブ 古本龍太

毎週金曜日にロサンゼルス花市場へお内陣にお供えするお花を買いに行 っています。花市場にはたくさんお花屋さんがあるのですが、たいてい ふたつのお店に行きます。そのうちのひとつが日系のKono and Sons

というお店ですが、11月の初旬 にストアマネージャーから「もう 今年でお店を閉めることにした。 」と言われました。

マス先生によると、Kono and Sonsが「マーケットで一番いい菊 を売っている」と言われます。そ して、実はこのお店はお寺のメンバ 一の本川パティさんのご兄弟が経営 されているお店で、5年前にパティ さんのお兄さんが、洗心に妹が行っ ているということを知り、それ以来 いつも菊をダーナしてくださってい たのです。今年でもうLAで一番いい 菊をおそなえできなくなるのが残念 ですが、いつもダーナしてくださっ ていたKono and Sonsに感謝申し 上げたいと思います。

ダーナは、日本語では布施とい い、簡単に言えば、ほどこすことで す。仏教ではダーナが大切な修行、 またはたしなみ、としてどの宗派で も行われています。そして、お寺は 基本的にはこのダーナの精神にのっ とって運営されます。

ブで、両者が金銭やサービスを贈り あうのが理想です。我々は普段の生 活では、ギブアンドテイクを多用し ています。お店に行って、お金を払 い、商品を受け取ります。私たちは お金をギブして、商品、たとえばお 花をテイクします。お店はお花をギ ブしてお金をテイクします。今の世 ではこれが経済活動の基本的な考え 方です。

けれども、お寺ではできるだけギ ブアンドテイクの考えをせずに、ギ ブアンドギブをしようとつとめる場 所です。それが精神的な安らぎをえ ることにつながるからです。ギブア ンドギブはしばしばギフトの形で感 謝やサポートの気持ちを表します。 お寺をサポートしようと、お花をお 寺に贈る。それで何か得たり、見返 りを考えないようにします。ギブで 終わりです。そして、お寺はお花が 贈られても、贈られなくても、仏法 を伝えますし、仏法を伝えるギブで 終わります。

けれども、お寺ではなにか感謝の ダーナの精神とは、ギブアンドギ 気持ちを表したい、とお礼という形

でギフトを贈ることがあります。た とえば、Kono and Sonsへは、毎 年お歳暮ということでギフトを贈っ ていますが、それは感謝のしるしと いうことで、それはいただいたもの への支払いということではありませ

我々は、なにかいただいたくと、 感謝したくなるもののです。その感 謝の気持ちが、人と人をつなげ、相 互尊敬、相互信頼が生まれ、それが 平和なコミュニティーや社会の実現 につながるのです。それで、ハーモ ニーを大切にするということで、和 合衆とよばれる仏教のサンガでは、 できるだけギブアンドギブの精神で 布施を行うとなっているのです。

年末にかけて、お布施をするご縁 やホリデイやお歳暮など、感謝を表 すご縁があります。できれだけギブ アンドギブの考えをもって、ギフト を贈りあいましょう。

Is this movie good or bad? Let's watch the movie at the Bodhi Day **Gathering**




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Jyoya-ye / **End of Year** Service December 31, 2018 Monday, at 6:30pm

Senshin Vehicle Donation

This is a reminder that Senshin will take any vehicle (car, pickup, truck, motorcycle, and even boat) as a donation to the temple. Donors can report the full amount of funds received from the vehicle donation as a deduction on their tax returns.

We work with Harold's Car Donation Service (HCDS) to have vehicles picked up, processed and refurbished as necessary to bring in the highest sale amount for the donated vehicle.

Once the proceeds from the vehicle donation are received by Senshin, a letter is sent to the donor to acknowledge the vehicle donation. The letter includes details of the donated vehicle and the amount for which the vehicle was sold or salvaged. All donors will be acknowledged in the *Prajna*.

Prajna Paperless Program

We are taking a survey of our *Prajna* readers to see if we can reduce the cost of mailing hard copies of the monthly newsletter and encourage you to read the *Prajna* by e-mail.

Each month, about 430 copies of the *Prajna* are mailed out to members and friends. The printing of the *Prajna* is not only time-consuming but uses an average of 1,500 sheets of 11x17 computer paper in addition to toner and the wear and tear on the printer. After the 430 copies are printed, they require collating, folding and inserting into pre-labeled envelopes before taken to the post office for mailing. All of this is done by the mailing crew of volunteers.

Considering the labor of the *Prajna* mailing crew, we would like to encourage our readers to receive their *Prajna* via e-mail. If enough of our members would agree to go this route and remove their names from the *Prajna* mailing list, this would help immensely. Our goal is to

reduce our mailing list down to 100.

These are some of the benefits to

making the change from receiving a hard copy of the *Prajna* by mail to reading the *Prajna* by e-mail:

- You can share the *Prajna* easily between family and friends.

- Most of all, you are helping our temple production and mail out crew of volunteers.

the main offices and classrooms. With that in mind, we should see the temple electric bill decrease soon.





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This November we completed the last class of the year, our Raku/Tea Class. Due to timing for articles for the Prajna we won't have pictures of the class's finished work for this issue. The firing of the *raku* tea bowls is an exciting process, which takes about 80 minutes per firing. Our kiln is small which is typical of *raku* kilns. We do about six firings during the day. The results of each firing are almost immediate. Once the red-hot pieces are removed from the kiln with metal tongs they are placed in a sealed container with newspaper and pine needles. This starts a reduction process that gives each piece its own unique look. After about twenty minutes the pieces are removed from the container and allowed to cool to the touch at which

time the piece is cleaned to reveal its final look.

I was excited to see Ted Akahori and daughter Julie take the class together. I'm sure Ted and Julie would be happy to share their experiences with you. Although



the day of firing is long, the potluck meal makes it even more enjoyable. I hope you will take advantage of our class offerings. I will post next year's schedule as soon as I can. I hope to have another Goinkyo Yakimono class as well as Pottery and Home Ikebana.
