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GIVING GIFT, Sharing kimochi

December is a season of giving, marked by *Oseibo*, Christmas, and even the end of the tax year—a perfect time to make donations to the temple! For Buddhists, giving is seen as an expression of *dana*, or selfless generosity.

When we give, especially in the spirit of *dana*, it's the *kimochi* (the thoughtfulness) that matters most. *Kimochi* literally means "holding spirit" or "holding feeling" and connotes an appreciation, consideration, or kindness. In everyday expressions, we might say *kimochi ii* to mean "I feel good" or *kimochi warui* for "I feel sick" or "this feels unpleasant." It's a word that expresses the sense of holding or carrying a feeling, and in the context of gift-giving, it signifies the thoughtfulness and care we bring to an action. When we give with kimochi, we're giving with our heart, expressing gratitude, affection and connection.

This idea is beautifully illustrated in a Japanese story similar to O. Henry's The Gift of the Magi. In the Japanese version, a

poor samurai wants to express his gratitude to his devoted wife, who never complains despite their hardships. He decides the perfect gift for her would be a *kanzashi*—an ornamental hairpin—to adorn her beautiful hair. But, lacking money, he sells his sword, a symbol of his pride and status, to buy it.

At the same time, his wife wants to show her gratitude to him; so she decides to buy an ornament for his sword case, which would elevate his appearance as a samurai. But she, too, lacks funds; so she sells her hair to afford it. When they meet to exchange gifts, they are both surprised and a bit saddened: the husband has no sword for his ornament, and the wife no longer has her hair for the kanzashi. Yet they are filled with joy, moved by each other's thoughtfulness. They have truly received each other's kimochitheir kindness, love, and appreciation.

In The Gift of the Magi, the husband buys his wife a comb for her hair, while the wife buys him a chain for his watch. Both stories, whether Japanese or Western, convey the same message: it's the thought, or kimochi, that counts.

In Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, Amida Buddha's wish, or Hongwan (Primal Vow), centers on peace and safety for everyone. By reciting the *Nembutsu*, we receive Buddha's vow and kimochi. Rennyo Shonin expressed this in his writing:

"...the sacred name is a gift we have received from Amida Buddha. Therefore, all we do is entrust ourselves to Amida in accordance with Amida's *Vow, enabling us to be born in* the Pure Land. We are saved immediately, and our response is only to express gratitude, reciting the Nembutsu in appreciation." (Rennyo Shonin Goichidaiki Kikigaki)

When we receive this kimochi from Amida Buddha, we recite the *Nembut*su, "Namu Amida Butsu," as a way of expressing gratitude to Amida Buddha. This gratitude inspires us to share peace and safety with others.

In this season of giving, we can carry forward this spirit by giving meaningful gifts during Oseibo, Christmas, and even end-of-year donations. Sharing *kimochi* in these ways spreads warmth, gratitude, and connection to everyone around us.

一方、妻もまた夫に感謝の気持ち を表したいと思い、夫の刀を装飾する 飾りを買うことを決めます。そういった 飾りは、夫をもっと素晴らしい侍に見 せます。しかし、彼女もお金がありませ ん。そこで彼女は自分の美しい髪を売 ってその飾りを買うことにします。

その晩、贈り物を渡そうと家に帰る と、二人はお互いに驚き、少し残念に 思いました。夫は飾りを付ける刀を持 っていなく、妻はかんざしをつける長い 髪がありません。それでも二人はお互 いの思いやりに感動し、喜びました。彼 らは互いに本当に「優しさや愛や感謝」 を受け取ったのです。〇・ヘンリーの「 賢者の贈り物」では、夫が妻に美しい 髪のために櫛を買い、妻は夫に金時計 用の鎖を買います。日本の話でもアメリ カの話でも、同じメッセージが込めら れています。それは、贈り物で最も大 事なのは気持ちをシェアすることだ、と いうことです。

2024 Bodhi day Sunday, December 1

In the Mahavana tradition, we celebrate December 8th as Bodhi Day, honoring Shakyamuni Buddha's enlightenment. Around 2,500 years ago, under a pipala tree in a forest in India, the human Gautama Siddhartha awakened to the truth of the universe and became the Buddha. This tree later became known as the "Bodhi tree," and the town where Gautama attained enlight-

enment is now called "Bodhgaya." The words Bodhi and Bodh mean awakening or enlightenment. To commemorate this special day for Buddhists, we will hold a Bodhi Day service on Sunday, **December 1**, with Rev. Mas as our guest speaker.

Bodhi Day Meditation session

Following the Bodhi Day service, we will hold a quiet sitting meditation session to honor Shakyamuni Buddha's attainment of Nirvana. The session will be conducted in silence, and meditation instructions will be provided at the beginning. Everyone is welcome to join.

Oseibo Service Sunday, December 8, 10a

The word Oseibo in Japanese means "year-end gift." The characters break down as follows: *Q* is an honorific prefix, sei means "year," and bo means "end." In our tradition, Oseibo gifts are presented to ministers and others who support the temple, as a gesture of gratitude for their guidance, kindness, and dedication throughout the year. Following the service, we'll have a yearend luncheon to celebrate together.

Ohsoii Sunday, December 15, 9a

Ohsoji is a major cleanup to beautify all sections of the temple. Oh means big or major and Soh ji means clean up. let's clean up our temple.

Ojo Raisange Practice December 29, Sunday, 10a

We will hold a practice session for the Ojo Raisange chant. There will be no Sunday service on this day.

Jyoya-ye / End of Year Service December 31, Tuesday, 5p

We are going to hold a Jyoya-ye service on New Year's Eve. Jyoya-ye is a year-end service that literally means the gathering (ve) of Jyoya (eliminating the night). "Eliminating the night" implies "wishing to remove the dirt or filth collected during the year." In this case, the dirt or filth means our blind attachments, the memories of misconduct and troubles that accumulated during the year. With the wish of dispelling these undesirable wants, thoughts, and memories, we hold the year-end service, welcoming the New Year with a refreshed mind. We will chant "Ojo Raisange, Shoya ge. (The Gatha of the Early Evening of the Gatha of Praising the Birth in the Pure Land)." You can learn to chant Ojo *Raisange* by attending the chanting class on Sunday, December 29.

In Buddhism, cleaning is one of the important practices or daily deeds. Our surroundings are a reflection of our hearts and minds and vice versa. Cleaning outside means cleaning inside. When we clean up outside, we can also clean up in our heart and mind. After Mochitsuki, to welcome the new year with a refreshed mind,

Shusho-ye, or Gantan-ye, simply means "Service for the New Year." The literal translation of Shusho-ye is "a gathering for a revision, modification or correction." New Year's Day is an opportunity for us to refresh our hearts and minds by reflecting upon the past year's mistakes so that we can correct them and begin the new year in the right direction. Our New Year Service will begin at 10:00 a.m. This year, for the first time in three years, we will have ozoni and sake in the Social Hall. We are also going to have a *taiko* and Shishimai performance at the courtyard.

Once the proceeds from the vehicle donation are received by Senshin, a letter is sent to the donor to acknowledge the vehicle donation. The letter includes details of the donated vehicle and the amount for which the vehicle was sold or salvaged. All donors will be acknowledged in the Prajna.

Our Anitya Fundraising drive is off to a roaring start. We have raised more than \$82,000 since our kick-off in October. The total project budget is \$250,000. Unspent 70th Anniversary funds were rolled into the 75th/Anitya pot giving us startup seed money of about \$75,000. So the total Anitya budget of \$250,000 less the \$75,000 seed money leaves a fundraising goal of \$175,000.
