


Nobody, Yet Somebody

In Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, we do not strive to become *somebody*—a famous or important person. And if we are already *somebody*, we do not show it off or boast about it. Instead, we try to live humbly. In the humble and open heart, Amida Buddha’s wisdom and compassion naturally flow through us, and nobody can be somebody.

This idea is similar to *mingei* (folk crafts)—simple, handmade objects created by ordinary people for everyday life. Their beauty comes not from trying to make “art,” but from creating sincerely and naturally. In fact, some say that



mingei, made by “nobody,” can be more beautiful than what artists create.

In Jodo Shinshu, this spirit is especially important. Shinran Shonin wrote, “*Bits of rubble turn into gold*” (*Notes on ‘Essentials of Faith Alone’*). The “rubble” refers to ordinary,

unenlightened people (*bonbu*), and the “gold” can be understood as .

We do not aim to attain enlightenment or commit ourselves to become bodhisattvas. Instead, by entrusting our powerless self to Amida Buddha, we receive Amida’s boundless compassion, which naturally works through us. In this way, even ordinary people can reflect the qualities of a bodhisattva.

Many other Buddhist traditions encourage people to strive to become bodhisattvas. In Jodo Shinshu, however, we reflect honestly and recognize that we are far from such an ideal. Yet, precisely in that recognition, Amida’s compassion embraces us. We may then find ourselves helping others or making offerings—not from obligation, but simply because we feel moved to do so.

Though we may think of ourselves as “nobody,” from the perspective of others, we may appear to be like bodhisattvas. By realizing we are nobody, we may naturally become “somebody” in the truest sense.

In today’s world, many people want to be influencers on social media. But if you try too hard to be “somebody,” it often doesn’t work. If you simply share what you enjoy, people may naturally be drawn to you. From Buddhism’s view, the way to be an “influencer” is not to try to be one.

Master Genshin (942–1017), also known as Eshin Sōzu, was a brilliant Tendai monk whose writings deeply influenced Shinran Shonin. He became a monk at 13, and by 15 he was already giving lectures on Buddhism that impressed even the emperor.

The emperor rewarded him with

fine clothes and a high priestly rank. Master Genshin, overjoyed, sent these gifts to his mother. But she sent them back with a poem:



**I thought you would be a bridge
To the next world (Pure Land),
And I am saddened to see
That you are still attached to this
world.**

Her words reminded him that a true priest should help people, not chase after fame. Realizing this, Master Genshin left the center of Mt. Hiei for the remote area of Yokawa to devote himself to Pure Land practice.

He later wrote the *Ojo Yoshu* (*Essentials of Birth in the Pure Land*), which vividly described both hell and the Pure Land. This work inspired countless people and influenced Honen Shonin and Shinran Shonin. Genshin did not seek fame—but by being humble, he became a great influencer in Buddhism.

At Nishi Hongwanji in Kyoto, there is a beautiful gate called the *Karamon*, a National Treasure built in 1591. It

is usually closed and only opened for very special guests. It is also called the *Higurashi-mon* (“All-Day Gate”), because its carvings are so exquisite you

could spend the whole day looking at them.

One carving tells an old Chinese story. A wise hermit, Kyoyu, was offered the emperor’s throne. But he rejected power, fame, and wealth, saying, “*My ears are dirty just hearing this.*” He went to wash his ears in the river. His friend Soho, who had brought his cow to drink, said, “*This water is polluted with talk of power and wealth. I will not let my cow drink it.*” And he led his cow upstream.

This carving teaches the same lesson: Don’t try to be “somebody.” When we let go of ego, we are free. By being nobody, we can truly be somebody.

「なにもものでもない」生き方

浄土真宗では、あまり「なにものか (somebody)」になろうと勧めたり、思ったりしないようになっています。偉い人になってやろう、有名になってやろう、とせず、人から尊敬される立派な人であっても、それを誇りません。むしろ、謙虚に生きることを大切にします。念仏の教えを聞き、「自分が」という思いが薄れてくると、阿弥陀さまの智慧と慈悲が自分を通して、自然にあら

われてきて、それが素晴らしい生き方だと讃えられることがあります。

これは民藝にも似ています。民藝は名のある芸術家ではなく、無名(むめい)の人が日々の暮らしのために誠実につくったものです。特に「芸術」を目指したのではなく、自然と出てくる美

名誉を離れ、比叡山の横川に移って浄土教の修行に専念しました。そして『往生要集』を著し、法然上人や親鸞聖人に大きな影響を与えたのです。

また、西本願寺の唐門には、中国の賢者・許由の故事が刻まれています。皇帝から次の皇帝になれと勧められたとき、許由は「そんなこと

を聞いただけで耳が汚れた」と言って川で耳を洗いました。名誉や権力を求めなかったのです。この故事も「なにもものでもない」ことの大切さを伝えていきます。

現代では、SNSで「インフルエンサーになりたい」と思う人が多いですが、無理に「なにものか」になろうとしても上手くいきません。ただ自分の好きなことを自然にシェアしていると、人

は自然に集まってきます。実は、インフルエンサーになる秘訣は「インフルエンサーになろうとしないこと」なのです。

アメリカの文化では「Be somebody」とよく言われますが、浄土真宗では逆のことを教えます。「なにもものでもない」からこそ、自分を通して、本当の「なにものか」が出てくる。念仏者は「なにもものでもない」存在ですが、そのまま阿弥陀さまに生かされ、周りの人にとっては「妙好人」と映ることがあります。それが正信偈に

善人も悪人も、どのような凡夫であっても、阿弥陀仏の本願を信じれば、仏はこの人をすぐれた智慧を得たものであるとたたえ、汚れのない白い蓮の花のような人とおほめになる。

とある意味です。私たちも「なにもものでもない」心で、南無阿弥陀仏とともに日々を歩んでまいりましょう。

しさがあります。「なにもものでもない人」が作ったものに、人々をひきつける、深い美しさがあるのです。

源信和尚(942–1017)は比叡山の僧侶で、親鸞聖人にも大きな影響を与えた方です。若くして才能を認められ、当時の天皇から立派な衣と高僧の位を授かりました。源信和尚が、それを喜んで母に贈ったところ、「あなたは人々を浄土に導く橋になると思っていたのに、まだこの世の名誉に執着しているのですね」という意味の歌を添えて、送り返したと言います。

源信和尚はこの言葉にハッとして、

This is a great opportunity to deepen your understanding of Jodo Shinshu practice. New participants are warmly welcome.


Currently, we are learning and discussing Senshin's funeral practices—the traditional and current programs, the manner of the service, and the significance of the rituals and chantings.

On **Sunday, October 19 at 10:00 a.m.**, we will hold a joint memorial service honoring Eshinni, Kakushinni, Lady Kujo, and the late members of Senshin Fujinkai (BWA).

Eshinni was the wife of Shinran Shonin, and their daughter, Kakushinni, established the foundation of the Hongwanji temple. Lady Kujo, daughter of the 21st Monshu, played a key role in founding the Fujinkai in 1904.

This service is sponsored by the Senshin BWA, and our guest speaker will be **Rev. Yukari Torii of the San Fernando Valley Hongwanji Buddhist Temple.**

Donation College Savings 529 Plan

Senshin has a College Savings 529 Plan to help with the costs of higher education for our minister's family.

Contributing to this fund will provide tax-free income for the minister's children when they are college age. In eight years at 7%, monies put in today could almost double by the time they are ready to go to college.

If you would like to contribute, you have two options:
 1. Write a check out to Senshin Buddhist Temple along with a memo or note indicating you would like to contribute to the 529 account.

2. You can write a check out to MESP (Michigan Education Savings Program) and mail it directly to PO Box 55925, Boston, MA 02205-5925. Be sure to send a note indicating the contribution is to go to the Senshin Buddhist Temple, Account #9393725.

If you write a check to Senshin, there is no minimum. If you write a check to MESP, the check must be \$25 or more.

Owned by the temple, the intention of the fund is to provide additional support to its minister and family.

Vehicle Donation

This is a reminder that Senshin will take any vehicle (car, pickup, truck, motorcycle, and even boat) as a donation to the temple. Donors can report the full amount of funds received from the vehicle donation as a deduction on their tax returns.

We work with Harold's Car Donation Service (HCDS) to have vehicles picked up, processed and refurbished as necessary to bring in the highest sale amount for the donated vehicle.

Once the proceeds from the vehicle donation are received by Senshin, a letter is sent to the donor to acknowledge the vehicle donation. The letter includes details of the donated vehicle and the amount for which the vehicle was sold or salvaged. All donors will be acknowledged in the *Prajna*.

Wasabikai

This past summer, Wasabikai members enjoyed a tour of the nonprofit Armory Center for the Arts in Pasadena. Our guides were Senshin member Leslie Ito, who is the Director of the Armory, and her colleague Danielle.

The Armory is neither an art museum nor an art school, but a hybrid of both. Contemporary art exhibits inform education programs and vice versa, and art is integrated into many forms of learning. For example, they merge visual art with math and science to teach courses in the local public schools.

The Armory offers year-round, free art classes for children, teens, older adults and families at parks, community centers, and juvenile justice centers across the region. They support community artists by exhibiting their work and embedding Armory Teaching Artists at local social service organizations.

They offer scholarships and target the low income BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) community.

In addition to a large pottery studio, we saw an art gallery, a dark room, a type press room, a painting studio using live models, both traditional and digital art forms, and lots of children running around! The kid's pottery displays reminded us of Saishin Dojo. What an amazing and very large, two story facility.

Danielle led us in thought provoking discussions during our tour of their current exhibit "My hands

are monsters who believe in magic," featuring contemporary photography, video, and ceramics by ten diverse Asian American artists. Each explores the endless, messy, contradictory and sometimes dark process of understanding oneself in relation to history and community.

After our tour, we retired to a wonderful Tibetan/Nepalese restaurant where we ate lots of yummy food, and chatted about what we had seen and learned. A wonderful day all around
